Audition



An audition in drama is a performance showcasing your skills and talent as an actor. This is held in front of a panel who then make the decision whether you are suitable for the job. In an audition, you may have to prepare a monologue, learn one on the day or participate in a range of acting workshops. To get jobs as a performer in the Performing Arts industry, you will have to attend an audition process.

Physical Skills

Body Language – How you communicate your emotion using your body
Facial Expression – How you communicate your emotion

using your face **Gestures** – A movement part of the body to express an idea or meaning

Vocal Skills

Pitch – How high or low you speak
Pace – How fast or slow you speak
Pause – When you stop speaking
Power – How loud or quiet you speak

Key Terminology

V-effect: Overall term of Brechts' work, his work is a style of Non-Naturalistic theatre

Placards: Presents additional information on stage, helps the audience know what is happening on stage

Direct Address: Where the actors speak to the audience

Narration: Where the Narrator comments on a piece of action, this can be done through voiceovers or an actor on stage

Multirole: Where the actor plays more than one role, they will need to change both Vocal and Physical skills

Social, Political and Moral Messages: This is where parts of the play convey certain messages whether this is due to the background of the character, the politics or the morals behind a performance

Physical Skills:

Facial expressions, Body language, Gestures, Movement, Levels, Posture, Gait, Cannon, Unison
